
WHEREAS, the Columbia County Local Public Safety Coordinating Council has reviewed the Plan and recommends that it be adopted;

Program Description:	Local incarceration of Justice Involved Individuals (JII's) at the Columbia County Justice Facility. Local Control JII's- Incarceration of sentenced JII's at the local jail for sentences of not more than twelve months. This includes Columbia County Court sentences, probation revocations, parole/post prison supervision revocations and administrative sanctions.
Program Category:	Custodial/Sanction Beds
Program Objectives:	Provide increased control authority over relatively short-term Adults In Custody (AIC's). Offer a range of sanctions to appropriately respond to violations of supervision conditions.
Method(s) of Evaluation:	Success will be evaluated by the JII's serving jail terms without incident, participation in available in-custody resources, and making a successful return to the community. Data collection is through a statewide data base and with CIS with results reported in the Department's annual report. Community Justice staff will track SB 1145 (Local Control) bed days used in the local facility.

Program Name:	Pretrial Services
Program Description:	<p>Pretrial services programs manage the release of individuals who can be safely monitored in their communities, so that they are allowed to pursue or maintain employment, participate in educational opportunities and their normal family lives, with decreased risk of endangering their fellow citizens or fleeing from justice.</p> <p>This pretrial services program provides an evidence-based pretrial system which lays the foundation for public safety and reduced recidivism by providing an assessment-based recommendation for jail release, reducing potential harm to defendants and their families, monitored release and support for defendants, and swift response to non-compliance, therefore holding defendants released on pretrial monitoring accountable. This is one of the major services the Community Justice Department provides.</p>
Program Category:	Other Programs and Services
Program Objectives:	<p>To maximize public safety, to maximize pretrial release, to maximize court appearance. Provide an alternative to security for release from custody.</p> <p>Current research shows that pretrial incarceration is directly correlated with the severity and length of the sentence imposed at time of conviction.</p> <p>Provide the Courts with informed release recommendations, based off of risk assessments, and community stability factors.</p>
Method(s) of Evaluation:	<p>Pretrial data will include appearance rate by risk level, length of incarceration until release on pretrial monitoring, and pretrial detention ratio. Data will be collected to reflect the number of defendants released with or without the posting of security, by case type (felony or misdemeanor), pretrial risk level, and pretrial length of stay until released. Data will be collected to reflect the number of defendants who had at least one charge for new criminal activity which allegedly occurred during pretrial release, by pretrial risk level, case type, and supervision level (Standard, Enhanced, Intensive, Reduced Pretrial Release). Data will be collected on assessment scores, charges, monitoring level, and pretrial outcomes. Data collection will be done through a contracted automated system to enhance the ability to track dispositional outcomes. Information from the Pretrial Services case management program will complement additional data collected, including the number of assessments conducted during the biennium, the ratio of the target population granted pretrial release, the success rate of participants, including in treatment and programs offered to each client for a more accurate picture of the outcomes. Data collection will provide a basis to evaluate systems improvement, impact of early intervention and referral to services, along with enhancing court appearances, which will result in the reduction of crime and reduced prison populations.</p>

Program Name:	Parole and Probation Supervision.
Program Description:	Community supervision of Justice Involved Individuals (JII's) placed on formal supervision by the Courts or transferred into Columbia County, Department of Correction releases, and Short Term Transitional Leave (STTL) Adults In Custody (AIC's). JII's will be assessed using evidence based tools, by trained staff, for guidance in determining risk level, criminogenic needs, and needs based upon specialized assessments. The needs assessments will be used to appropriately connect JII's with treatment and services to increase their stability and reduce their risk for re offense. JII's will be assigned to the appropriate caseload and supervised based upon their risk to reoffend level. Case plans will be developed collaboratively, for each high and medium risk JII. These JII's will be given priority surrounding supervision and services. Supervision will include but not be limited to office contacts, field contacts, referrals to treatment, monitoring for substance use, and victim and collateral contacts. Sanctions and incentives will be utilized by department guidelines and available resources to deter violation behavior and reinforce Specialized caseloads will include domestic violence, sex offenses, and specialty courts.

Program Objectives:	Complete assessments, case plans, and referrals early on in supervision in order to frontload services to reduce recidivism, Close cases as positive case closures, Promote successful completion of supervision conditions using research informed methods.
Method(s) of Evaluation:	Periodic evaluations, to include case reviews by Department Supervisor. Annual Caseload audits to confirm completion of assessments, referrals, and contacts. STTL data and outcome measures tracked by the Department of Corrections and the Criminal Justice Commission as it relates to Justice Reinvestment Initiative. Community Corrections Reviews conducted by the Department of Corrections

Program Name:	Sex Offender Treatment
Program Description:	Provide treatment to Justice Involved Individuals (JII's) convicted of sex offenses and ordered to counseling and treatment as part of their supervision. Services include group therapy and individual sessions to address thinking errors and deviant behaviors. Polygraph testing is incorporated into the program to assist the PO in monitoring compliance to supervision requirements, monitoring of sexual deviance, and for protection of the community, known victims and potential victims.
Program Category:	Behavioral Health Tx Services - Sex Offender Tx
Program Objectives:	Enhance public safety and help prevent future victims by providing JII's a specialized, structured treatment program to address criminal thinking and sexual deviancy issues. Participation in this program will be enforced in order to address clients' needs and increase public safety. Utilize evidence-based practices in delivering supervision and treatment services.
Method(s) of Evaluation:	Department of Correction's Program Evaluation will be utilized in determining if the program is evidence-based. Data entry into CIS with referral date, program start date, completion or discharge date with reason why will be used to determine recidivism and success rates.

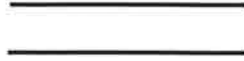

AOS counselors will assist the PO in release planning to include housing and aftercare. The PO will be provided ongoing status reports regarding participant attendance, participation, and attitude in treatment.
Program Category:	Behavioral Health Tx Services - Substance Abuse
Program Objectives:	Justice Involved Individuals (JII's) in need of treatment will be evaluated and referred to evidence-based treatment programs. JII's will decrease their substance use/dependence with the use of an individualized treatment plan that includes client self-efficacy and ability to plan for situation which may be triggers for JII's. Utilize evidence-based practices in delivering treatment services. Provide ongoing status reports to the supervising officer regarding treatment progress.
